Worm charming was another of the exciting activities and the children all had to work together in their team to see who could entice the most worms to the surface. The children stamped their feet, played musical instruments, banged the ground and even sang songs to persuade the worms to surface.

The children learnt what a buttercup, dandelion, clover, daisy and dandelion clock looked like. It was lovely to hear their excitement during the treasure hunt the next day when they found plants that they could name.

#### Year 3—Miss Chapman & Mrs Watson

This week in Year 3, we have been focusing on equivalent fractions and finding unit/non-unit fractions of an amount. In English, we have been writing and performing play scripts, some that have already been made but some that we have written ourselves! In History, we have been exploring how crime and punishment has changed throughout the years and we were shocked to see some of the punishment from the Medieval era. In Science, we have been exploring how shadows are made and how UV Light can have both positive and negative effects on the world around us.

#### Year 5—Miss Spencer

This week in year 5, we have completed our decimals! We have been learning how to add and subtract numbers with different decimal places and then we moved onto sequencing decimals. We now know how to find a sequence, continue a sequence and find missing numbers within a sequence.

In English, we have been editing and improving our big writes from last week. We have used editing station cards and our marking ladders to make sure we have all the features in our writing. We then used all of the improvements that we made and wrote our final diary. Our grammar focus this week has been to learn how to write sentences in subjunctive mood and we wrote sentences for our final diary in this style. Today, we have been looking at Kennings and having a competition to see who could guess what the Kenning was about.

In topic, we have been comparing India and Great Britain. We discussed the difference in weather and how that impacts on farming and lifestyle. We then looked at the differences in temperature between Jaipur (India) and Cheshire and plotted a bar chart showing the yearly average temperatures.

Well done to all the Year 6 pupils who took their SATs this week! You were amazing!

Our music lessons with Mr Birch will be back on as normal next week.

#### Year 4—Mr Hazeldine

We have been working on our money strand in maths and we have done brilliant. Excellent reasoning skills have been displayed which is fabulous. We look forward to moving onto our next strand.



Cheshire East residents are being invited to sign up to a free training session about online safety and security.

Last year an estimated five million cases of computer misuse and fraud were reported – accounting for almost half of all crimes reported in England and Wales in 2017.

To help educate residents about cybercrime, the council has partnered with Get Safe Online to hold two training sessions later this month. The first will take place in Crewe at The Georges Community Centre, West Street, from 1pm-4pm on Monday 21 May. The second will take place in the Capesthorne Room, at Macclesfield Town Hall, from 1pm-4pm on Tuesday 22 May.

The sessions will cover topics such as creating secure passwords, shopping and banking online securely, social media, how to prevent and report fraud, identity theft and abuse.

Councillor Janet Clowes, Cheshire East Council cabinet member for adult social care and integration, which includes responsibility for safer communities, said: "Unfortunately, it is the most vulnerable people in our communities who are more susceptible to scams. However, it is important that everyone knows how to stay safe online.

"I urge residents to sign up to these free sessions and to share the information they learn with others around them, such as friends, relatives and neighbours."

The training sessions are being funded by monies recovered under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 by Cheshire East Council and places are limited.
